



2026 FUNDING OPPORTUNITY QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Below are the questions and answers submitted regarding the 2026 Funding Opportunity as of January 29, 2026.

- 1. What if the budget category I need isn't listed in the "budget" section on the application?**
[A] Add new budget categories by clicking the "+" immediately
- 2. The "Fringe" budget category is not available. How should I list fringe?** [A] Fringe should be included in the "Personnel" category when completing the Budget Module and include more specifics in the narrative/description section for clarity.
- 3. Is Indirect eligible?** [A] No – Indirect Costs are not an eligible cost under the 2026 Funding Opportunity.
- 4. Are organizations allowed to submit an application for multiple programs?** [A] Yes – Due to anticipated high demand, in 2026 only one (1) application per organization is permitted. If an organization has multiple programs/projects with a desire for funding, both may be included on one application; be sure to clearly identify budget differences and how deliverables will differentiate.
- 5. Our organization is a 501c3, Not-for-Profit. When registering in Euna Grants, the available Organization Type(s) do not include "Not-For-Profit". Which type should we select to avoid an ineligible application?** [A] Select either Foundation or Corporation for your organization, if you are a 501c3. In the WCCMHB Funding Opportunity application there is a specific question which will allow for the Not-for-Profit distinction.
- 6. As a school, how would we submit a program for 26/27 school year as it extends past the program term?** [A] Reach out to Teena regarding specifics.
- 7. Is an PLLC ineligible for this funding?** [A] Simple answer is yes, unless, there is a clear collaboration with a Government, or Not-for-Profit to provide program/service/initiative. If you have any questions, reach out to Teena to discuss in-depth.
- 8. The County Board District question is displayed twice. Do I need to answer 2x?** [A] Yes – this is a method of advocacy and should be answered how ever many times it is viewable on the application.
- 9. In Question 11, when you ask applicants to describe community strengths, are you primarily looking for strengths of the community itself (for example existing infrastructure, protective factors, or readiness for engagement), or strengths related to the organization's established role and relationships within that community?** [A] We are looking for both 1) the strengths and challenges of the community that you propose to serve and 2) the strengths that your organization will bring to that service. Community doesn't necessarily mean a town or village. It can be a specific demographic for ex. at risk high school age youngsters, individuals living with mental illness, person living with intellectual/developmental disability who are aging out of services, etc.
